







The Southeast Regional Folk Alliance (SERFA) has found a home in the Asheville area these past six years at the tranquil Montreat Conference Center to host our annual conference. We welcome all to attend who are interested in the promotion, education and furtherance of acoustic music in our region.

In light of the "Public Facilities and Private Security Act" HB2, which was hurriedly signed into law against normal due process, SERFA will continue to welcome all regardless of sexual preference, identity or gender, without regard to religion, nationality or race. We encourage unity and decry "legislation" that fosters discrimination, prejudice and fear.

Montreat's own website states: "We will continue to invite our conferees, guests, and visitors to use the restrooms in which they feel most comfortable." SERFA, our attendees and the Local 1000 Musician's Union stand together in ensuring nondiscrimination for all who attend. Folksingers have a long history of standing up for the oppressed and against injustice, and we will continue to raise our voices against this legislation.

The backroom politics that created and passed HB2 is a blight on the face of North Carolina, and SERFA is proud to stand with the majority of not only North Carolina citizens but the American people in general, businesses, artists and religious leaders who are advocates of equal rights for all and against HB2.



A talk and Q & A about taking the step towards music for practical social charge by setting up a non-profit organization to run alongside the music and shows. Martyn and his wife Justine set up Let Yourself Trust, and they work with small grassroots organizations that make a difference. His audiences donate funds which are passed on to these groups or individuals who are receiving no grant or government funding to make a real difference to peoples lives. They team up with a different organization every six months and have so far worked with a children's village in Guatemala, a homeless shelter in Wales, an albinism project in Uganda, a children's theatre in Palestine and are currently supporting a First Nations community in Canada battling a massive mercury dump in their waterway.

#### MOTIVATIONAL: WHEN TO QUIT YOUR DAY JOB

#### Rebecca Loebe, Caroline Cotter, Cathy Fink - Moderator / 334

Mary Chapin Carpenter didn't quit her day job until two years after her first major label album was released. Many people manage a full-time or part-time job along with a music career. The answer to the question, "When should I quit my day job?" is different for everyone. In this workshop, we'll discuss realistic expectations, what kind of elbow grease it will take to make enough money to live on and cover important expenses such as health insurance, vehicle & insurance, rent, recordings, promotion, etc. Many great artists never go "full time" and others gradually go "full time" as more music opportunities come along. Hear from two artists who also quit their day job and let's talk pros, cons, skill sets and ideas on how best to think about the answer to this question.

### **KARI ESTRIN FOUNDING PRESIDENT'S AWARD**

for Outstanding Contributions to Music and Culture in the Southeast Peggy Seeger Award Recipient & Keynote Speaker: THE SINGERS, THE "AUDIENCE," THE SONGS 4:15pm - 5:45pm / Convocation Hall



Fifteen years ago I was asked by Folk Alliance to chair a meeting to help organize the future SERFA region. Since that time I've chaired two conference planning retreats and five conferences, with an almost three-year break in between.

During that break, I created a special award that reflected the many years of conversations I had as SERFA's Founding President that helped define both the creation of our region and also what our conference has become. Fortunately through my almost 45 years in music, I have had the privilege of working with many artists, some now-legends and have had the honor during this last decade and a half to meet and learn about those from the SERFA Region that deserve our special recognition.

Back in 2005 SERFA initially planned to have our first conference to Asheville, and it was then I contacted Peggy Seeger's team to see if she might be able to attend. Presently a UK resident for many years, Peggy briefly resided in Asheville in the 90s. Now after roughly a decade our schedules aligned and Peggy is here, both to accept my award for her myriad contributions to folk and acoustic music, while being featured as our keynote speaker.

I am also pleased to award special recognition to three deserving individuals in the greater Asheville area - for their significant contributions and anniversaries and whose

reach extends far beyond North Carolina: longtime and outgoing SERFA Board Member, Jim Magill, the Founding Director of the Swannanoa Gathering which features a five-week series of workshops attended by musicians around the globe; Founding & Current Executive Director Jennifer Pickering from LEAF Community Arts, for over 20 years of her leadership of LEAF'S internationally known festival and programming; and an individual who has dedicated over 40 years to calling and researching dance, Phil Jamison, whom last year published a book *Hoedowns, Reels, and Frolics: Roots and Branches of Southern Appalachian Dance.* 

## **KARI ESTRIN FOUNDING PRESIDENT'S AWARD RECIPIENTS**




**Peggy Seeger** was born in 1935 to the first family of American folk music. Her father was noted ethnomusicologist and composer Charles Seeger. Her mother, Ruth Crawford Seeger, was the first woman to win a Guggenheim fellowship in composition. Crawford Seeger was also an acclaimed folksong anthologist; she had initially been introduced to folk music in the 1920s when Carl Sandburg hired her to arrange folksongs for his American Songbag. Peggy found her home and her first life-partner in the UK with playwright and songwriter Ewan MacColl, who wrote The First Time Ever I Saw Your Face. She and Ewan had three children and Peggy now has nine grandchildren. A multi-instrumentalist, Peggy is known for her excellent renditions of Anglo-American folksongs and for her activist songwriting, especially in the fields of feminism and ecology. Two of her best known songs are The Ballad of Springhill and the feminist anthem I'm Gonna Be an Engineer. After living 35 years in England, Peggy returned to the USA in 1994 and took up residence in Asheville, North Carolina. She moved to Boston in 2006 to teach songwriting at Northeastern University and back to England (Oxford) in 2010. At 81, Peggy now confines her touring to the UK as a solo artist. With 23 solo recordings to her credit, Peggy has participated in more than a hundred recordings with other artists, one of whom is her second life-partner Irene Pyper-Scott. A multi-instrumentalist, Peggy has also


written music for films, television and radio. Seeger has published a songbook with 150 of her 200+ songs **The Peggy** Seeger Songbook, Forty Years of Songmaking, Oak Publications, 1998. Her album EVERYTHING CHANGES, was released September 2014 (Signet Music). A new biography **Peggy Seeger: A Life of Music, Love, and Politics** by Jean Freedman is due for release in the coming winter from **The University of Illinois Press**. He performs and sings solo on guitar, cittern, mandolin and performs with his wife Beth (flute) and son Andrew Finn (fiddle) as the Celtic trio, The Magills. With numerous album and performance credits, including appearances with Emmylou Harris and Tom Paxton, Jim's original songs have been covered by such artists as Mike Cross, The Smith Sisters, Cucanandy and the Shaw Brothers and have been featured on NPR's Thistle & Shamrock. In the world of graphic arts, his cover designs for the Gathering's catalogs have won eleven design awards, he's twice been a finalist for Photoshop World's Guru Awards and has served as a consultant on website design for several luthiers.


